South Lyon area first responders monument fund

The Monument will have the original bell from the city hall that collapsed in 1957 as the main focal point. It was originally used as a notification device for the first responders to be alerted to local emergencies in the community. As a result from the buildings collapse, the bell sustained a crack that was never repaired, reminding us of the disaster of that day.


The cost of the memorial is approximately \$50,000. All proceeds raised from the challenge coin sales will go directly to the first responder memorial fund.

Coins can be purchased in person from the South Lyon Police Department with exact cash or check made out to the City of South Lyon with the memo: First Responder Memorial Fund. ## **Collapse of City Hall**



On Monday, November 11th, 1957 the 72 year old building that served as South Lyon's Town Hall collapsed while two DPW workers were repairing a water main near by. The following Wednesday, the building was demolished.


Built in 1882, the building stood on Lafayette St (where Providence Medical Center now sits), and served as both City Hall and the fire station. For a brief period in 1915, the

second floor also served as the high school.

During the collapse, the bell that was in the tower was moved to it's location in South Lyon's



Historical Village campus, where it sits today. Upon close inspection, the crack that was a direct result of the 1957 collapse can still be seen on the surface of the bell.



Funds raised will go toward updating the First Responders monument to honor those who are in service to our community.



## **Challenge Coins**

Challenge coins are traditionally given to members who visit military or law enforcement venues, which are both collected and traded. Historically, challenge coins were given to commemorate specific events.

Today, they are collected as well as traded worldwide.

#### Fire Fighter



The front of the coin features the Witch's Hat Depot atop the Maltese Cross. The back features a 3D imprint of the original fire department/city hall with the bell tower that will be incorporated into the memorial.

#### Police



This coin represent the core values that serve as the foundation of the department. Featuring a badge and American flag with the words "courage, honor, integrity and service" on the front and "Safeguarding our Community" on the back.
